The Coryell & Smalley Families of Seneca County, N. Y. and Their History

Wallace Coryell 1879-1966 Son of John Harvey and Jennie Gibson Coryell Note: This document was not titled, nor did it have an author attributed, but internal clues point to James Wallace Coryell as the author. He was at one time the Seneca County, N. Y., historian. Some minor typographical errors have been corrected, but not all. Where previous owners or readers of the document have added information, it is highlighted in blue [my corrections or comments in brackets]. Page 22, on the Louise Coryell Reigle descendants, was added by members of her family.

Pages 3-22 concern the Coryell family; pages 23-31 are about the Smalley family.

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CORIELL'S

The Coriell's were of French extraction and came to America from the Isle of Corsican in 1663.

The family were Hughenots and driven from their Country.

The first Coriell of which there is any public record is Abram Coriell, of Piscataway, Middlesex County, N.J. in 1702.

His mark for Cattle, Horses, Hogs, etc., is three slits in ye right ear, one in ye top of ye ear, and a slit on each side.

Entered this first day of September 1702, signed Edward Slates Town Clerk. This is from the Piscataway Town records, and is the first known Public Record of the name of Coriell in America.

Abram Coriell was a Free Holder in Piscataway Township. Middlesex County, N.J., in 1702.

This record is from the East N.J. through the Elizabeth bill in Chancery.

The name is spelled several ways - Coriel, Corrilel, Corriell, Coryel, and Coryell.

These spellings were not written by any Corriell, but on the will of David Coriell it is Coriell.

He bought small tracts of land in the neighborhood of New Market, and he came quite an extensive Land Holder, most of which is now occupied by the City of Dunellen, N.J. and considerable of the mountains of the North.

David Coriell was a weaver by trade.

[A newspaper article listing the above inventory was published in the *Interlaken Review* (N.Y.), January 24, 1913, and is reproduced below.]

John H. Coryell has in his possession an ancient document of considerable interest which he prizes very It is a bill against the highly. ABRAM CORIELL, was baptised March 4th 1739, at the dutch reform Church at SomervIlle N.J. All the other Coriell'sdown to Abram were Quakers. He seemed to be the first one to desert the religion of his ancestors. Probably his mother was of Dutch Reform faith, as he was only five months old when baptised.

During the Revolutionary War he at first furnished bread and shirts for the Continental Army, and was a minute man, and served in sundry tours of defense on the frontiers of New Jersey.

He enlisted as a private in the Middlesex County New Jersey Troops, and from June 10 to Dec. 15 1779 he was a scout for General Washington, while the Army occupied Hunterdon Co. There is one tradition that he was taken prisoner by the British when they started for New York City with their prisoners when he escaped, but the Adujant Generals office in Trenton makes no mention of his ever being a prisioner.

Both before and after the war he resided on his farm of 200 acres in the Township of Piscataway Middlesex County, and died September 22nd, 1828, and was buried in the Coriell Burying ground on the farm. After his death the farm changed owners a number of times and about 1880, that part on which was the Grave and became the property of a German, he had all traces of the burying place removed and took away the tomb stones, many were used for building purposes among them were the ones which had marked the graves of two brothers David and Abram Coriell, Revolutionary Soldiers, their wives and many of their decendents.

An old House that stood by the road was moved back among the farm buildings for a wagon house, the walls were built on a foundation of Grave Stones from the cemetery. It was supposed that all had been used until a carpenter recently in making some repairs about the House found a stone in the yard.

Richard E. Coryell, of Plainfield, N.J. being notified went there and found partly under one of the buildings a well preserved stone inscribed D.C. IN THE MEMORY OF DAVID CORIELL WHO DIED SEPT. 22nd, 1803 IN THE 68th YEAR OF HIS AGE.

Three other stones were found in a little ditch which had been used for a watering trough for horses where they had been put to hold the bank back from caving in. They were almost hidden in weeds and mud and one was inscribed Elizabeth wife of David Coriell, born June 10th, 1737, another recorded the death of Abram, one of his sons, and another was the stone of Abram Coriell who died Sept 22 1828, aged 90 years, the Verse on the stone reads,-

COME LOOK UPON MY GRAVE ALL YOU THAT PASS BY WHERE ONE DOTH LIVE TO SUCH AN AGE THOUSANDS DO YOUNGER DIE.

These two revolutionary Soldiers were ancestors of nearly all the Coriells in New Jersey. Their graves deserve better treatment.

It was Richard Coriell's intention to take the old stones and have a new base cut for it, and renew it to the old Cemetery of the Presbyterian Church at Somerville, where they were members.

He now has all the Grave Stones raised and located as near as he could and has taken photographs of them so as to guard against future obliteration of the records.

ESTER HEATH, born June 22nd 1738, died March 20th, 1796.

ANDREW HEATH, Father of Esther, was an interpreter to the Indians, lived in Hopewell Township, then in Burlington County, then in Mercer County three miles north of Trenton, N.J. where he died.

ABRAM CORIELL, **b**orn September 17th, 1772, hearing of the glowing accounts of the Lake Country as told by the soldiers that came back home from their campaign with General Sullivan, he decided to leave New Jersey.

In the spring of 1804, he and his family came to Seneca County and located east of what is now Scotts Corners in the Town of Ovid, where the road angles to-ward Interlaken.

Later he moved west of what is known as Coans Corners (Town of Ovid) and later to Reading Center, his next move was to Wayne, Steuben County.

The war of 1812 being declared he on March 6th 1813, enlisted as a private in the 13th Regiment U.S. Infantry, Captain Myndert M. Dox, Company for the war and was killed by the Indians near Fort Erie, Upper Falls Canada, Sept. 4th 1814, leaving his wife Anna Covert Coriell with 9 children.

RECORDS IN THE ADUJANT GENERAL'S OFFICE OF THE DEATH OF ABRAM CORIELL, On the 4th day of September 1814 the Colonel called for 40 men to go and rout out the Indians who were killing off the night guards. When two miles out 200 Indians rose up all about them. The odds were so great that all started for the fort but only two got there, 38 being killed.

Then the Colonel called for 200 men. They went out proceeding cautiously along among their fallen comrades when a lone Indian sprang from behind a tree and fired the shot that killed Abram Coriell.

ABRAM CORIELL

Abram Coriell, married Anna Covert, daughter of Luke Covert and Anna Marselis. They are buried in the Covert family burying ground near Dunellen, N.J. His tomb-stone is inscribed

IN LOVING MEMORY OF LUCAS COVERT WHO DIED JAN. 22nd, 1822. IN HIS 90th YEAR. REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER.

The verse on the stone reads the same as the one on David Coriell's.

Anna Covert was born May 5, 1771 in Somerville, N.J. and died in 1852 [1842?], and is buried in the cemetery at Wayne, Steuben County, N.Y.

The first five were born in New Jersey. After the death of Abram his widow married Israel [sic - Gershom] Bennett of Wayne, N.Y. and had children - names not listed.

(Notation of J.W.C. When I was about five years old and lived at Kendaia I remember a minister by the name of Stanton who preached at the Baptist Church there. His wife was a grand-daughter of one of the children born to the widow who married Bennett.)

THE CORIELL'S IN THE REVOLUTIONARY ARMY, who went from New Jersey were

(Note. I do not think Elisha was in Revolutionary war for if he was a son of David, David was not born until Mar 15th 1795).

Joseph and John Coriell were in 1st Regiment Continental line.

George, he being a carpenter he built a gate in Philadelphia for Benjamin Franklin. Washington riding by one day saw it and looked up George and prevailed on him to go to Alexandra. He moved down there and worked at his trade for many years, and there is a good many of his decendents living there.

One of his sons was standing by looking at Washington's funeral procession, when one of the active pall bearers was taken with a fit or fainted. When called for someone to take his place young George Coriell helped to carry Washington to his grave.

DAVID L. [I.] SMALLEY

Written by John H. Coryell and read at the Smalley Reunion at Hannah Smalley's home at Romulus in 1909.

I do not know the month he left to come here, I have been told that he was a deputy sheriff and came up on a horse-back to Cayuga County looking for a prisoner. At any rate he left the Town of Warren, Somerset Co., N.J. sometime in 1815, then he crossed Cayuga Lake probably at Bridgeport. Coming back here he located Joseph Hunt on what is now the C. S. Boyer farm, later the Horatio Burritt farm. There he spent the night with Mr. Hunt. Mr. Hunt had a saw mill on this farm which was a crude affair – they had to have a man stand and feed the logs up to the saw with a bar. Mr. Smalley asked Mr. Hunt why he did not make a machine to do the feeding. Hunt said he did not know how and asked Smalley if he did. He replied yes. I suppose this was his first thought of coming here to live. He went back to New Jersey and the next year loaded his goods in a large covered wagon and started with his family. I have heard my mother tell of this trip, how they tied the cow behind the wagon and the pigs in a box and started for the lake country.

They came through the Beach Woods of Pennsylvania, the wayside taverns and private dwellings accomodated them with room to spread their beds for the night. I have heard Mother say they milked the cow, strained the milk and put it in the churn and the jolting of the wagon did the churning.

He located a little north of Willard on the west side of the present road on what was the Seeley Conkling farm.

I do not know how long he lived there but later moved over to the Joseph Hunt farm, by the old mill. He must have lived there some time as he had a shop made of logs and made Grain Cradles and Wagons, the Cradles being better made than any other in the town and became known as the Smalley Cradle.

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I have heard Aunt Susan Miller tell how she as a girl would hold the candle for him to repair the broken ones that were brought to his shop for repairs, which he did during the night so they could have them to use the following day.

Aunt Susan Tucker Miller was a niece of Grandmother and lived with them a long time. She told me that Grandmother used snuff and many times she had walked to Romulus or McMaths at Seneca Lake to buy a few cents worth of snuff. I have the snuff box made of ivory end lined with tortoise shell and bound with gold.

David I was a fine mechanic. I have an old chest that he made with the corners dovetailed together. You can hardly see the joints today. I also have one of his broad axes he used to hew the timbers.

When mother (Abigal) was married he made her a set of chairs and later a cradle to rock her ten children.

In 1873 Aunt Huldah Smalley Monroe from Michigan made us a visit. I was with her to the Old Mill Wheel and many interesting things about the Mill and Creek she related.

This story told by Susan Miller about David I. He never was in a hurry to get home to supper, they always had to wait for him. Once when coming home from work he thought he heard one of the neighbors cows in the thicket at the side of the path. He thought he would do a good deed by driving it home, but he told how the cow proved to be **a** black bear. That night he got home before supper was ready.

Aunt Huldah when here on **a** visit told me the following: One day at their home an old man come to David I's home and said he was Luke Sweatland and was taken prisioner by the Indians at Cherry Valley Massacre* and was confined by them for about one year at the Kendaia Indian Village. The following Sunday David I, my mother and Aunt Huldah went over to the old Indian Grounds. Sweatland showing them how the village was located, and said that he probably was the first white man that over planted wheat between the Lakes. He procured a quart of wheat from one of the Torries and planted it in September 1779.

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Sweatland was released by Sullivans Army when they came through here. He supposed that all of his family was dead but found two of his brothers in the Army with Sullivan.

NANCY TUCKER was born near Scotch Plains, N.J. of Quaker descent.

They lived at the time of Nancy's death in a house on the North East Corner of the field now owned by John M. Sutton, about one mile east of Sutton School House.

JOHN SMALLEY

In a large volume bound in Velluire now in the Rolls Office Channery Lane, London are records of a few Early Emigrants to New England. On the cover Is this inscription "A book of Entrie for passengers by ye Commission and Souldier passing beyond the Sias begin at Christmas 1631 and ending Christmas 1632 xxx"

The first entry of persons for New England as follows: VII Marcys 1631.

The names of such men as auto be transported to New England to be resident there upon a plantation have tendered and taken the Oath of Allegiance according to the Statute Vist xxx John Smallie, Edward Winslow xxx

June 15th 1632 the ship's Frances and James arrived at Boston, among its passengers were Mr. Edward Winslow and John Smallie, settled in Plymouth in 1632. Admitted to the freedom of the Colony of New Plymouth and took the Oath of Fidelity in 1643.

In August 1643 his name on a list of all male's able to bear arms from 16 years to 60 years old.

In 1643 with Governor Bradford and others repaired to Nauset (in Barnstable Co Cape Cod) and made a full and accurate survey - place was not sufficiently extensive but they thought proper to purchase it from the Indians.

In April a new settlement was commenced and the Town of Plymouth was almost deserted, among prominent men who removed to Nauset was John Smallie. In 1651 the Court ordered that Nauset should be henceforth called Eastham.

John Smallie was freeman at Nauset before 1647, and freeman of Eastham as late as May 22, 1655.

In the records the name is spelled Smaley, Smallelly, Smally.

John with his wife Ann and two sons, John and Isaac, he removed to Piscataway, Middlesex Co., N.J. not earlier than 1668 or later than 1670.

In the third list of planters before 1670 is found the name of John Smallie.

Almost all the early settlers of the Township were Baptists. John Smallie was one of the Founders of the Baptist Church, the oldest but one in the State.

John Smallie and his son John Jr. Isaac were prominent men and held many Important offices.

The date of the First Grant of land to John Smallie Sr. for 118½ acres of land is Sept. 10th 1678 which is the date of many other grants.

The first rent on the first grant to John Smallie Sr. and John Smallie Jr. began in 1675 showing that they were living there at that time but took their deeds in 1678.

There were no grants to Isaac Smallie from the will of John Smallie Sr., it appears that Isaac and his father lived in one family.

The land on Ambrose Brook was left by will of John Smallie Jr. to his son Johnathan who in turn left it to his son Andrew, who mortgaged it in October 1771 and again in 1776. In Piscataway Township the record show the following: John Smallie his mark is a crop on ye right Ear and a piece out off ye hind part of ye ear near the jaw.

He was elected magistrate Sept 6 1673, received commission as Justice of the Peace March 13th 1675. At this time a Justice of the Peace was a member of the Supreme Court.

Much information relating to the Smalley family can be obtained from the records in State Department Trenton, N.J. County Offices at New Brunswick, N.J., Piscataway Township minutes, Seventh Day Baptist Church records at New Market.

Isaac was a son of John and lived on the Mahlon Smalley place on stony hill.

Jacob was the son of John and Tabathy Moore.

The sons of David Smalley were Henry, Daniel, Samuel, and David D. who owns a large

estate in Warren in the Pasaic Valley.

Smalleytown takes it name from the family who have been numerous and influential citizens.
